

Baltimore City Community College
Student Right to Know Disclosure - May 2018

This report provides an overview of full-time, first-time students who entered Baltimore City Community College (BCCC) in fall 2014 and their outcomes for completion, transfer, and ongoing enrollment.

I. Graduation and Transfer-Out Rates

During the fall semester of 2014, 390 first-time, full-time students entered Baltimore City Community College seeking a certificate or a degree from BCCC by August 31, 2017 (for Associate Degrees) or December 31, 2015 (for Certificates), the outcomes were as follows.

- 50 (13%) of these students completed their BCCC programs.
- 40 (10%) last attended a four-year institution of higher education without graduating from BCCC.
- 49 (13%) were still enrolled at BCCC.
- 35 (9%) last attended a two-year institution of higher education without graduating from BCCC.

Not every student who enters full-time can continue studying full-time over the subsequent semesters because of household and employment obligations. Many students need 0-credit developmental courses in order to prepare for and succeed at the college level. Note that in addition to the 50 completers, there were another 40 students who transferred to four-year institutions without graduating from BCCC and another 49 students who were still enrolled at BCCC pursuing their programs at the end of the indicated timeframes. These categories accounted for 36% of the entering cohort. An additional 9% transferred to another two-year college without graduating from BCCC.

2. Retention Rates

During the fall semester of 2015, 403 student entered BCCC as full-time students for the first-time and were seeking a degree or certificate. They did not attend another postsecondary institution prior to attending BCCC. Their outcomes were as follows.

- 20 (5%) of these students completed their BCCC programs.
- 35 (9%) last attended a four-year institution of higher education without graduating from BCCC.
- 93 (23%) were still enrolled at BCCC.
- 31 (8%) last attended a two-year institution of higher education without graduating from BCCC.

Note that in addition to the 20 completers, there were another 35 students who transferred to four-year institutions without graduating from BCCC and another 93 students who were still enrolled at BCCC pursuing their programs at the end of the indicated timeframes. These categories accounted for 37% of the entering cohort. An additional 8% transferred to another two-year college without graduating from BCCC.

3. Employment Rates

Through data sharing arrangements with the Maryland State Department of Education; Maryland Higher Education Commission; and Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation; and the Maryland Longitudinal Data System Center, BCCC graduates' employment data are collected and reported annually for many occupational programs via the Perkins Program Quality Index (PQI). Records for graduates of the selected programs are compared with payroll records to determine how many are employed in any field, whether full-time or part-time. The PQI reported that 78% of BCCC's FY 2016 graduates from the programs shown were employed six months after graduation. The statewide average was 70%.
